

# Fountains In The Sand (Annotated): Rambles Among The Oases Of Tunisia





## **Synopsis**

Once found, it is generally of the pederastic nature. An Austrian-born Scott, Douglas spent much of his adult life traveling the world partially to see it and partially to escape the law in whatever country he recently had departed. Although he married his cousin in 1898 and fathered two sons (the marriage later ended in divorce), the year before that marriage he was having an affair not only with a mistress but also her fifteen-year-old brother. In 1916, Douglas fled England to, in his own words, â⠬œavoid persecution for kissing a boy and giving him some cakes and a shilling. Aca ¬A· The sixteen-year-old boy in question described the matter less innocently to police, leading Douglas to be charged with indecent assault. Douglas settled in Capri. His book of travel Together, published in 1923, finds him traveling with a companion he refers to as Açâ ¬Å"Mr R,Aç⠬• who in fact was a fifteen-year-old Italian boy who went by the name of Ren $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\odot$ . Douglas was admired by E.M. Forster and Lytton Strachey ( $\tilde{A}$ ¢â ¬Å"the thrill that only you can give goes down my back, $\tilde{A}$ ¢â ¬Â• Strachey wrote to him after reading Together), and more recently by Paul Fussell, who likens him to Nabokov. D.H. Lawrence was fascinated with Douglas enough to base the character James Argyle on him in Aaronââ ¬â,,¢s Rod. Indeed, Lawrence uses Argyle to make one of his more profound statements on love between men, the same sort of statement found in the final pages of Women in Love. Addressing the Marchesse, Argyle says, ââ ¬Å"A man is drawn or driven. Driven,  $I\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a} - \hat{a}_{,,\phi}$ ve found it. The book is written from the point of view of twelve-year-old Eric Wolton, a working class boy Douglas took with him through Calabria. In Julie Grayââ ¬â,¢s review of the book for the New York Times (13 Aug 2000), she writes, ââ ¬Å"The question at the novelââ ¬â,,¢s center concerns Douglas: Is he, as one character puts it,  $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$   $\neg \ddot{E}\phi$  monster, the pedophile of the century,  $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$   $\neg \hat{a}, \phi$  or is he, as Eric says, a great man who had led him into a â⠬˜warm and sensuous world of adventures and lightââ ¬â,¢?â⠬• Eric, no doubt, would insist he should have the final word.As for Douglas,
