A really good insight into how Skinner approaches his work and the effort he puts into every facet of it. I would've liked more in depth discussion of each record's content though, rather than the process of putting things together. A bit lacking in personal information for me though. Very funny in parts and honest about his career trajectory while explaining his reasoning behind things without resorting to excuses and claiming any sort of moral or artistic victory too much.

Yet, he clearly exceeded expectations. I will admit that some parts may be boring for someone not too much into the 90's garage scene (I am not). But on the whole, this is a very interesting book.
