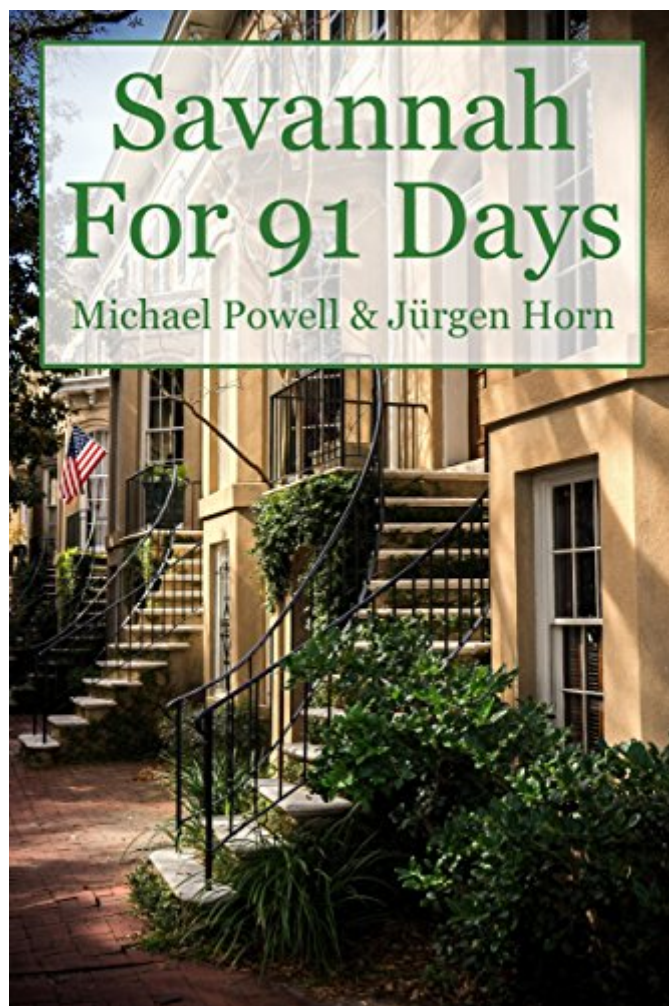


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# Savannah For 91 Days - 2016 Edition

The photography in this book is good enough that it makes you desire to take week off of work and go travel. I thought the little stories and anecdotes that were included in the book made it superior to a lot of travel and photo books. This is a book that it is easy to get lost in, whether you are local to the area or not. I would certainly recommend that you read this book if you are considering travel to Savannah. This book was a quick, easy read that taught me some things I didn't know. I would like to note that there is an error on the first page, where it states "After hearing the request from a number of readers, we thought a portable edition of the blog would make of sense." I am not trying to be picky, but I know a lot of readers tend to cringe from an error on the first page and refuse to consider finishing the book, and this one is too good to miss!

I bought an earlier edition of this book after following Jürgen and Mike's travels online. I always enjoy their insider perspective on environments they travel to. Their Savannah book was a great resource for my first ever visit to Savannah earlier this year. My only regret is that I didn't have more days to explore so I could visit all the sites in the book. What I appreciate most about this book is the concise approach to describing a multitude of highlights in Savannah, combined with the authors' personal experiences. The division of the book by sections made it really easy to see a list of the public squares and a quick description of each. Instead of having to read through pages of info on a spot, the authors give you enough info and personal experiences to quickly decide what you want to see and what you want to pass. I hope to make a future visit to Savanna and will definitely pick up the updated version of this book.

I read this book last year, but never posted my review. So when it came up again, I just HAD to chime in! As the other reviewers have all said, it's a 5-star read, for sure. Even if you are familiar with Savannah, or have visited just once like I have you will read about places you were not aware of. So now, I want to go back to Savannah again and check out the places these authors shared that I MUST see! Buy, borrow it, but GET your hands on this book if you ever have dreams or plans of visiting this wonderful southern city.

My husband and I often drive the 95 corridor between Florida and the NE and we will often make it a point to stay a night (or two) in Savannah. Up until now we've never had a lot of information to help guide our short stays. This book solves that problem. It's easy to read and well laid out. It has gorgeous pictures. This is not your typical travel book! Instead of writing about the popular tourist spots in Savannah these guys really get to know the personality of this eccentric city. I have been to Savannah many times and have a special place in my soul for the diverse residents and the haunting landscape. I was so excited to see that Michael and Jurgen were as enchanted as I was by this old city. The photography in this book is stunning! It really captures the essence of the city. If you really want to get to know what Savannah is about you would be wise to read this book! Well done guys!

Mike talks a lot about all of the pictures his partner, Jürgen Horn, took. However, I felt like they were really stingy on the photographs. I really love photographs and would love to have seen more. He kind of talked down about a lot of different aspects of the city. The book was more a scrapbook of their opinions regarding their stay more than anything else. But, if you want to tour Savannah, or are as interested to learn what Savannah is like (as I am... and NO, not because of Paula Deen nor "Midnight in the Garden Of Good and Evil" as Mike complains too many tourists flock there for) this is a kind of fun read (in a snarky kind of way). It needs many more photos, though, and less snobbery.

I learned some surprising things about Savannah. There was also some very frank criticism of the way some historic sites were operated. These writers actually move to the places they are describing, they stay there to study the place for 90 days. Their opinions on Savannah are unique in

that they are not Americans writing about America. If you want to know a little more about Savannah than you'll find in the usual Tourist Guide Books, this book is for you.

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
