


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One Hundred & One Beautiful Towns In Great Britain (101 Beautiful Small Towns)

Tom Aiken is a writer, poet, editor, theater director, musician, and critic. A cultural historian of Britain and Europe, he is a past winner of the Lincoln Memorial Essay award, author of two young adult novels, and has contributed to the Times Literary Supplement, The Guardian, and The Spectator.

I should have realized that a book covering 101 towns in 280 pages could hardly give much attention to each town, but it turns out to be worse than I expected. Only a handful of towns rate more than two pages (four maximum). Of the two pages most towns receive, one is devoted to a single full-page photograph and the other to text and one tiny (usually 3X3") image. Given the arbitrary restrictions (Why 101 towns? Why not a bigger book?), the text is often, though not always, adequate, but the selection of photographs is frequently bizarre. A photograph of a single building may be accompanied by one of an attraction nearby but not in the town itself (Salisbury Cathedral and Stonehenge, for example). My favorite is poor Dorchester, where neither picture represents anything in the town itself (the full page is of the Cerne Abbas giant, 7 miles outside town, presumably included for it's titillation factor, the other of the Hardy House in neighboring Higher Bockhampton). And why do we see only details of buildings, rather than the buildings themselves (a stone carving from Lavenham's great wool church, a similar detail of Beverley's glorious Minster)? Where, in these and many other cases, is the town? Yes, there are some good photographs, enjoyable for their own sake, but I experienced mostly frustration at the limited or wrongheaded

treatment of the many wonderful towns I know, and I got little sense of those I don't. The book simply tries to do too much in too little space, and it often fails on its own terms. I am mystified that four people have given this book five stars. It gave me very little pleasure.

Haven't gotten completely through this book but it is excellent. Separates the towns into regions and also provides an alphabetical index. The pictures are great but what is even better is the brief description/history about the town along with specific interesting things to visit/see as well as within the area of the town. I plan to use this to help on upcoming travels. The only drawback is that more towns aren't included! Maybe another book.

We recently went to Great Britain for eight days, basing ourselves in Manchester and using Brit Rail to travel to London one day only (it rained) and to York, Carlisle, and Chester, which are picture-summarized in the book. We visited Settle (mentioned as being beautiful, too), Selby, and Bolton. The villages were gorgeous as well--this book is good for reminiscence. It's fun to compare the pictures we took with the book's.
