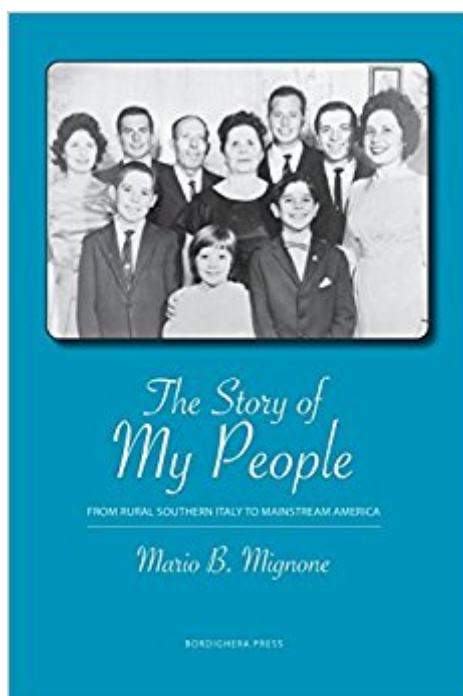


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# The Story Of My People: From Rural Southern Italy To Mainstream America

Mario Mignone is the founder and director of the Center for Italian Studies at Stony Brook University. He is director of student exchange programs with University of Rome "La Sapienza" and University of Messina. Mignone served as chairman of the department of French and Italian at Stony Brook for nine years, founded the Association of Italian American Educators and served as its first president. He is a former president of the Long Island Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of Italian.

Prof. Mignone's memoir of the lives of him and his family is an engaging, heartwarming, affirmative account of immigrant life in America. Mignone arrived in the 1960s with his mother and seven siblings. He was 20 years old and he and one of his sisters would be the breadwinners. It was a shock for me when I read that his siblings were placed in classrooms knowing no English and

without accurate assessment of the grade level they belonged in. He says quite simply "they cried for weeks." "The Story of My People" is must-reading for any immigrant and for those of us who are children and grandchildren of immigrants. The author's reaction to Wonder Bread is hilarious. When we were in school, my mother made our lunch on "white bread," but she and my father never ate it. They thought it suitable only "for washing floors." This is not to trivialize the problems of integration - it is not an easy task and just eating white bread won't do it. However, in "The Story of My People," the positive, energetic outlook of the Mignones and their extended family is an example of how to adapt and succeed after leaving the country of one's birth. Mignone's sense of humor, the unfolding of life in America for him and his family, his assessment of current conditions and his thoughts on the status of current newcomers make for an engaging read. Bravo to all immigrants and their descendants who benefitted from their sacrifices and hard work.
