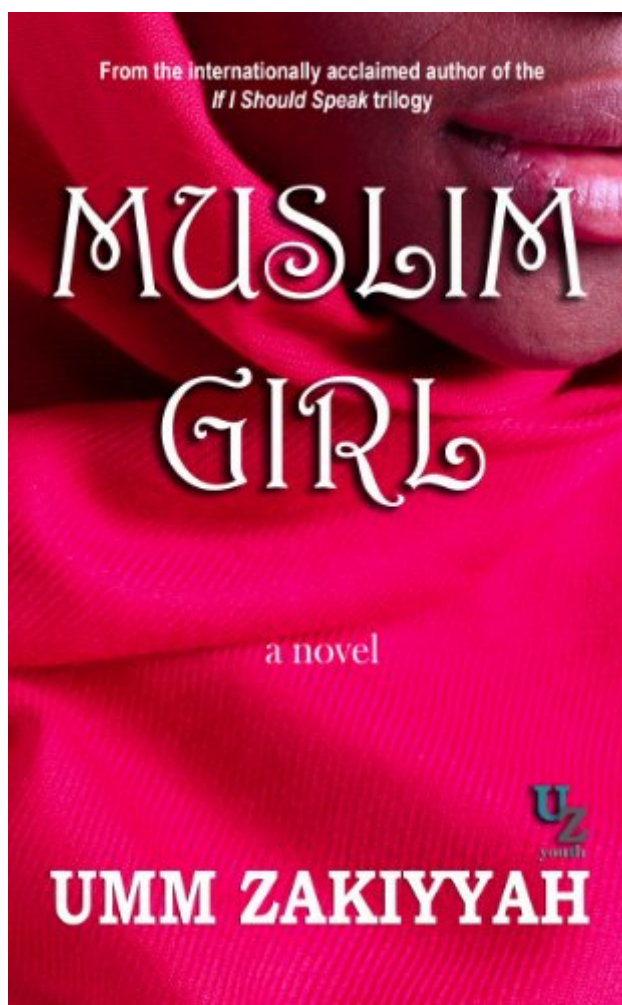

Mashallah this is my first Islamic novel and I loved the plot, the diction and the details; especially when it comes to expressing emotions. I am definitely getting one for my sister In Shaa Allah. Inaya who's the main character of the story faced trials and her Imaan was tested as teenager whose mom converted to Islam when she was a little girl. Umm Zakiyya brings to light in this story the prejudice between converts to Islam and born-muslims. It is very sad to know that this prejudice still exists in our lives even if we are oblivious to it. The challenges Inaya faced is no different than what all muslims face in their daily lives. Allah says in Suratu Al-'Ankabut [29:2] Sahih International "Do the people think that they will be left to say, "We believe" and they will not be tried?" Each of us have weaknesses we wish to overcome but we might not be brave enough to confront them. We read about how Inaya "conveniently" soils her hijab and loses the courage to wear it in school again. It is basically a nightmare for any Muslima who wears hijab for the sake of Allah Subhanahu Wata'aalah. I felt for her and I could only imagine how hard it was for her to live a double life considering the fact that she memorized the Qur'an already. We mostly expect people who have memorized the Qur'an to be flawless in their Imaan and we forget that they are people like us who need our support to increase their Imaan. We have to remember that Allah said that the best of you in the sight of Allah

are those who fear Allah the most and not those who have memorized the Qur'an. It was hard to accept that Inaya could take off her hijab but I had to come to term with the fact that she was still a muslim. We are constantly making excuses for transcending the boundaries Allah has set for us. This novel is a remind that we should wear hijab for the sake of Allah and not for our parents or anyone. I think Inaya forgot WHY she was wearing the hijab in the first place. Knowing WHY you do something is an important reminder for when you lose your way. This story is a wake call for us to set up and support each other to become better muslims. It also shows how families never give up on each other. I think Umm Zakiyya summarizes everything up in the epilogue when she mentions that it doesn't matter how many times we lose our way if we always find our way back to Allah. Allah Subhanahu Wata'aalah says in the Qur'an in Surat Az-Zumar [39:53] "Say, "O My servants who have transgressed against themselves [by sinning], do not despair of the mercy of Allah . Indeed, Allah forgives all sins. Indeed, it is He who is the Forgiving, the Merciful." I love this book and I will be reading it over and over again In Shaa Allah.
