


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Meditations: A New Translation (Modern Library)

This translation, so spare and direct, shows the great Roman at his best. Honest, without conceit. The Introduction to this translation is very, very good: instructive, educative and a most useful framing of what follows. As a first-time reader, I found Marcus' own texts fascinating but thought that the translation was occasionally oddly anachronistic, though forgivable always for its readability (my previous attempt at this text having gotten indigestion with the ponderous nineteenth-century prose). Marcus was clearly rather hard on himself in a cruel age. There is much to think on that bears on our own present age and always on our own self-evaluations. He was an admirable man.

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
