

For eight years she team-taught a freshman honors seminar on critical thinking and values analysis. She has published another undergraduate textbook with Pearson Education, Environmental Law (8th edition, 2012) and more than 75 articles. Brennan is an Emeritus Professor of Legal Studies at Bowling Green State University. He is a graduate of the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University (B.S. International Economics); the College of Law, State University of New York at Buffalo (J.D.); and Memphis State University (M.A. Economics). He was a volunteer in the United States Peace Corps, was employed by the Office of Opinions and Review of the Federal Communications Commission, and worked in the general counsel¢â ¬â,¢s office of a private international corporation. I should have listened to the review that mentioned spelling mistakes. There were also several incorrect case citation numbers, so that when I had to look up the case for class in Lexis Nexis, it would bring up a completely different case, or not find the case at all.

In their haste to get this (2015) edition out for the (2014) fall semester, the authors forgot to hit the "spell check" button (e.g., p. 78, p. 79, p. 169). What a waste of \$200+ when this edition is essentially the same as the previous one with the exception of a few updated case briefs.

Don't bother buying the 2016 \$270 8th Edition, this 2015 \$8 copy of the 7th Edition is the exact same book. Money well saved!
