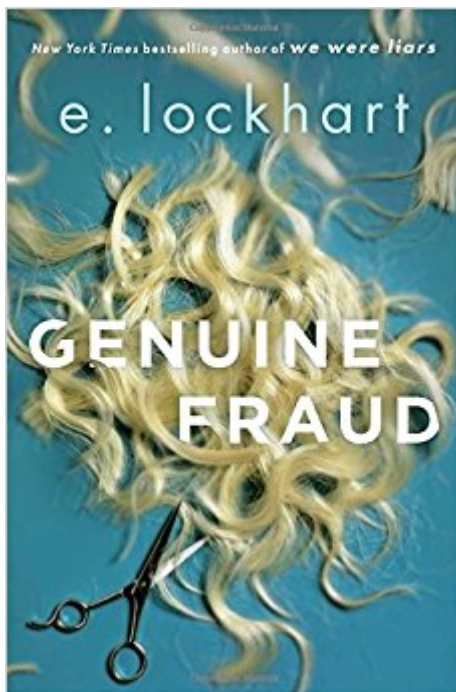


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Genuine Fraud

Lockhart had a great deal to live up to with the success of her most recent novel *We Were Liars*. After reading *Genuine Fraud*, I feel like she does a great job of providing another fantastic reading experience. When I read Lockhart's work I don't want to miss a thing and I felt myself slowing the pace of my reading, which was worth it. Her work is the kind that I could go back through after reading a first time, and read again, still getting something new out of it in a re-reading. This novel is full of suspense and intrigue. Jules is a character readers won't soon forget and the Single White Female vibe of the entire story and the way things are revealed makes this book un-put-down-able.

Genuine Fraud is the first Lockhart book I've read and I feel like doubling back to read her other books because this one was great fun. It has a wonderful momentum that makes it hard to put down. If you've read Patricia Highsmith's *Ripley* novels the homage to Lockhart's Jules protagonist is impossible to miss.* She tells the story backwards so you're always looking back to what came before. Early on in the action I would have sworn Jules was the consummate unreliable narrator but

started to doubt so as I turned the pages. Lockhart provides an accurate account of young people in their late teens and early twenties. She also stays away from overt cussing (the term effing stands in a lot) and no detailed sexual accounts are included so parents if you're ok with these paradigms you won't object to your kids reading the book. Truly frightening is how realistic the criminal behavior seems and how easy it would be for a desperate young person to slide into. It's odd how such misguided people are so likable as presented by Lockhart. *you don't have to have read the Highsmith books to enjoy Genuine or the other books she references owing a debt to in her back note but the Ripley books (except possibly for the final one) are wonderful.

What it's all about... This book is literally told backwards so it gradually makes sense by the time you get to the last page. Jule envies Imogen and does an amazing amount of life changing things to emulate and eventually become Imogen. This is one of those books that is written in such a complicated manner as to make it relatively confusing. It's a check back book because you often aren't clear about the characters, their actions and what you've read.
Why I wanted to read it... I loved this author's book... we were liars. That's why I wanted to read this book. I didn't love this book. I found the characters to be shallow and annoying... actually murderously annoying. Sneaky, dishonest and immoral can be added to their characteristics, too.
What made me enjoy this book somewhat... Jule was a clever psychotic person who didn't seem to have a moral to her name. Imogen was just confusing to me... mean, nice, mean, nice... I have no clue what she was.
Why you should read it, too... but prepare yourself... Readers who enjoy a bizarre mystery might enjoy this book. I did not enjoy reading it.

Jule West Williams is a young woman with many faces - and facades she's developed over time to seduce the unwary and take advantage of them, especially the rich. With a trauma-filled past (though that could be just part of her persona), Jule sees herself as a an orphan, alone in the world, and also as a cinematic action hero of sorts - but on her own terms. According to her, she was raised by an aunt, and forced to drop out of college due to sexual harassment - but the reader will quickly spot discrepancies in her backstory. When the book begins, she is staying (or hiding?) in a hotel where she quickly realizes that a woman she's just met may actually be a detective on her trail. As Jule takes steps to evade detection, the book unfolds in a backward time frame - starting with Jule's intimate friendship with heiress Imogen Sokoloff (also an orphan), which has gone awry with a few deaths along the way. Though Imogen is initially wary of Jule, she eventually warms up to her - but then signs appear that she is going to treat Jule just like all her other intimates that she

wooded and then discarded. As the reader puts the pieces of the mystery together, a scenario from "The Talented Mr. Ripley" emerges, with Jule taking increasingly desperate measures to avoid being brought to justice. Overall: The plot seemed a little too close for comfort to the aforementioned inspiration, but I enjoyed the book and the author's observations on such things as action hero stereotypes and such.

Jule is strong. She is athletic. She is resilient. Imogen is charming. She is wealthy. She is enchanting. Together Jule and Imogen could be the perfect pair. Or maybe that was never the plan. Whatever Imogen might think, Jule knows that they need each other. But Jule has everything under control because she is smart. Jule is the one who will save the day, not some great white hetero action hero. Jule knows that she is the center of her story and she'll do anything to stay there in *Genuine Fraud* (2017) by E. Lockhart. This inventive standalone thriller starts at the end. Jule is in Mexico. She's on the run. And nothing turned out the way she had planned. From there the story unspools toward the beginning and the unlikely twist of fate that set Jule on this path and her collision course with Imogen. Even knowing how it all ends, this homage to classic thrillers and Victorian novels packs in more than its share of twists and shocking reveals. Like Jule herself *Genuine Fraud* is shrewd, calculating, and electric.
