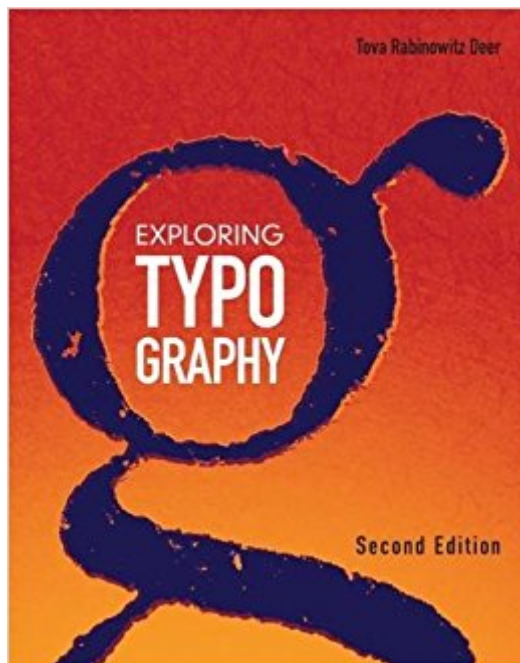

Even though this primer on typography is generously illustrated, it covers lot of territory, including history and grids in addition to the expected stuff. It achieves this through clear, concise writing, and carefully curated images. Each chapter concludes with review questions and exercises, facilitating use as a textbook (as do the included glossary and index). The only reason I didn't award 5 stars is my objection to the classification of Times New Roman as an oldstyle rather than a transitional

category typeface. This is the only time I've ever seen Times considered to an oldstyle, and I've been studying type more than three decades.

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
